Church Council Report

It's been a momentous couple of years, with COVID19 devastating churches not only here in the Georges River Presbytery, but right across the world. Here at Revesby we pivoted and started running online services via Youtube, ran a comprehensive pastoral care program, and kept everyone up to speed with regular mail-outs.

Finally, the direct threat of COVID19 began to ease and we were able to meet together once again. It wasn't long after we started meeting together again that our minister, Rev Michael Barnes announced his retirement. We needed to pivot once again, and pivot we did.

During the last 12 months we have maintained our online services via Youtube, which continues to attract a small but faithful following. These services are either uploaded live, or recorded for later editing and uploading. Council approved the purchase of the necessary equipment to enable this ministry which allows the services to be uploaded each week.

We have continued to have weekly mail-outs to the church community, informing everyone of upcoming services and what's happening.

Council continues to meet via Zoom, and keeps in regular contact through emails.

Council approved a rebuild of our church website, after devastating hacking destroyed our old site. The new site has basic information, including a calendar of events, but is still a work in progress. You can visit it at www.revesbyuniting.org

Council approved a rounding up of a donation to the UNICEF Turkiye-Syria appeal to \$500.

We organised and ran a church cleanup in July. Much junk was uncovered and disposed of!

Council members have attended a safe church training course.

Council has a service working group that is organising all of our Sunday services while we are without a minister.

A Council working party has sold our old manse and is in the process of finding an appropriate new manse for a future minister.

After many years of operation, Council approved the closure of the church evening service.

Council approved funds for a Preschool morning tea in support of all our hard working pre-school teachers.

A Council working party is working with Uniting to transition the Pre-school from being locally to directly managed. This process is hoped to be completed early in 2024.

Council recently passed a resolution to recommend to the congregation that we issue a 50% call for a new minister. As well as running 2 services a month, the minister would focus on pastoral care of the congregation.

Many thanks to everyone on Council who have worked tirelessly over the last 12 months to grow our church and maintain its vision of inclusivity, intellectual rigour, care and support.

A final note regarding our recently retired minister, Michael. His time with us was challenging through COVID19. On behalf of Council, I would like to formally extend our gratitude and heartfelt thanks for his wisdom, teaching and insights during his time with us. He is sorely missed by all.

Treasurer's Report

This financial year (July 1 2022 to June 30 2023) has seen greater stability in the world in general, the financial sector and consequently also for Revesby Uniting Church.

This last financial year has seen a couple of large financial changes for Revesby Uniting Church.

Firstly, the sale of the Revesby Uniting Church manse - at 1 Bluegum Cres, Picnic Point – early in 2023 was finally accomplished. Unfortunately, the settlement price was well below the suggested market valuation from mid-2022, but the property did suffer from water ingress damage and a depressed real estate market. The real estate agent we engaged worked hard to maximise the sale return on the manse – given the condition of the manse, the cutting back of loans by banks and the falling real estate market. Revesby Uniting Church managed to realise a little over \$1,000,000 from the sale after all costs were paid.

This amount has been placed into a Uniting Financial Services account (our Uniting banking system bank) for Revesby Uniting Church, were it has been accruing an increasing monthly interest that adds to the amount available to Revesby Uniting Church for when we source a suitable replacement manse property.

The Revesby Uniting manse committee has been investigating several properties in an effort to locate something suitable to our needs, but as of the AGM in October 2023, no suitable property in our price range or prescribed area has been found to date.

The manse sale fund has restrictions on what it may be used for/spent on – mainly the purchase of a replacement manse property and then, any left-over funds are to be used on mission.

Second, the other 'major' financial change for Revesby Uniting Church has been the retirement of Rev Michael Barnes. The total salary package that was paid to Michael by Revesby Uniting Church ceased upon his retirement in late 2022. The income that would have been paid to a Minister in placement now stays within our bank accounts and places us in a much better financial position to call a full time or part time Minister at some near future date.

Several outside groups have continued to make use of our premises during the day and at night – for which they are levied a rental amount – which is also helpful to our income stream.

On the negative side, motions are underway for Uniting Early Learning to take over the management of Revesby Uniting Church Child Care Centre (RUCCCC) – possibly in early 2024, making it a Directly Managed Service. How that affects our rental income from RUCCCC remains to be seen – but indications are that the monthly rental from RUCCCC paid to us is likely to decrease – it may depend on who accepts responsibility for what parts of RUCCCC.

As mentioned in my previous AGM Financial reports to Congregation, we are about to undergo our required annual external financial audit. While this falls outside of the 2022-2023 financial year, it is worth mentioning to the Congregation – and, of course, we had an external audit in October 2022 – in the previous financial year.

Again, my and the Congregations thanks to Barry O'Connor for taking the time and effort to thoroughly comb through our 2022-2023 financial year records to make certain that they are in order. The subsequent audit report has to be sent to UCA Synod of NSW & ACT and to Georges River Presbytery by 31st October 2023.

Church Council and the Revesby Uniting Congregation have agreed to a budget for the FY 2023-2024. This budget was initially prepared by our external accountant and was then "tweaked" by myself and Church Council. It was then presented to the Revesby Uniting Congregation at a previous Congregation Meeting where it was agreed to.

Our monthly income stream is positive and at present our monthly income exceeds our monthly costs, which enables our bottom line to build up – while not greatly substantial, it is much better than in the recent past. However, regular giving in its various forms, has been in decline for a while.

All in all, our present financial situation is sound, but this is likely to change when/if we purchase a replacement manse – there will be costs associated with owning the property; and if we have a minister in placement – again, there will be salary costs for them.

Attached is copy of the June 2023 financial report/statement that we receive each month from our accounting services. This copy is for the end of the financial year 2022-2023. Copies of the monthly statements are available online to all members of Revesby Uniting Church Council and any congregant can view a copy of a report upon request.

Receipts & Payments

Operating income for the month was \$8,643 consisting mainly of electronic and cash offerings (\$4,411) and Child Care Centre rent (\$3,311) – bring full year income to \$130,988 compared to budgeted income of \$132,711 and \$128,477 last year.

Total costs of \$10,031 were mainly the church's share of electrical repairs undertaken for the child care centre of \$8,691. Total costs for the year were \$94,183 resulting in an operational surplus of \$36,806 compared to a budgeted surplus of \$29,207 and a deficit of \$35,578 last year

What's in the Bank?

Cash in the bank (plus petty cash) at the end of the month was \$55,767. Net operating cash less net liabilities are now \$48,922. As at 30 June, 3 months rent from the Child Care Centre is unpaid.

Sale Proceeds

Sales Proceeds interest for June was \$3,658 leaving a balance at end June of \$1,094,629. Interest on Sales Proceeds is separately reported as it is retained in the restricted Sales Proceeds account.

Quarterly BAS Return

Attached are workings for your Business Activity Statement for the quarter. You are owed \$400 refund from the ATO which should be received in the next few weeks.

Payroll

Staff Income Statements (formerly Payment Summaries) for 2022-23 have been lodged with the ATO by the Payroll Bureau Service. Staff are able to review their annual Income Statements from their individual My.Gov account.

Year End Matters

Also attached is a draft Annual Financial Return for 2022-23 using the Synod Finance template. Could you please review this document, particularly office bearers and other non-financial information and advise of any amendments. As your income is in the \$100,000 - \$500,000 category you have the choice of having your accounts audited or engaging 2 independent people to undertake an assurance review of the accounts.

Property Committee Report

The Property Committee has been involved in and around the church throughout the last year. We see the larger works as they are noticeable, but there are many smaller problems that get dealt with behind the scenes. These get repaired without people noticing them, some of these are completed before the committee get to them or even know about them. To that end, I would like to thank all those who have fixed things around the place when they have noticed that they are broken or could be improved.

Some of the smaller projects that have been completed over the last 12 months have been repairing the toilet cistern in the men's urinal, replaced the toilet in the ladies bathroom, replacing the toilet seat in the internal bathroom, replacing the clock in the church proper,



cleaning up around the manse prior to its sale, installed removable wheelchair ramps at the front and rear doors and into the internal bathroom (the ramp for the front entrance doors is stored under the trade table in the foyer).

Larger projects around the place include the extension of the wooden arbor along the front fence and the installation of a decorative gate within the timber framework. This was done with the assistance of the committee and other volunteers. Thanks to the Church Council and the Garden Committee for organizing the purchase of the decorative gate.

Replacing the flashing on the roof in an attempt to stop leaks (unfortunately there was an extraordinarily bad storm shortly afterwards and we still had some issues with leaks – was this due to the new flashing or just bad luck? We are looking further into this with the intent to get a roofing specialist in to assist in finding where the actual problem is). Once the further roof works have been completed, we will be repairing the ceiling in the meeting room that has been damaged by the roof leaks.

A subset of the Property Committee, the Manse Committee, were active in the cleaning up of the Manse and pushing through the sale of this building earlier in the year. A special thanks must be given to Mark Gordon for all of his hard work in pushing through all the roadblocks from Presbytery and Synod to achieve a resultant sale. The Property Committee are now in the process of looking at potential new residences to purchase as a replacement.

Future works in the pipeline; As mentioned above, the meeting room ceiling will be repaired once we are sure that we have fixed the leaks, in the meantime a temporary repair will be carried out. We are also investigating replacing all of the locks and doorknobs as they are quite old and starting to play up.

Thank you to Mark Gordon, Colin Graham, Andrew Schepis and all the others who have assisted in keeping the church running.

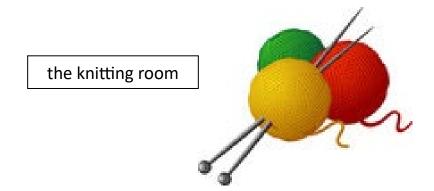

Kidsplay@Revesby Is a playgroup that meets each Wednesday in school terms between 9:30-11:30 am. We are funded by Revesby Workers ClubGRANTS to provide an early childhood worker.

Over the past year Kidsplay@Revesby has engaged with 29 families. This includes 32 children, 6 dads, 21 mums and 9 grandparents. We are an intergenerational group and a wide variety of cultural backgrounds are represented with over eight different languages being spoken. In 2023, many of our children from 2022 started school or pre-school, so we were thrilled to have 6 new families join our playgroup. Our group continues to grow.

Over the year we have provided 38 playgroup sessions and a Dance Party in a safe, supportive and engaging environment. Carers report that children are keen to attend and that it has assisted to build on children's skills in all areas, particularly in developing friendships and playing creatively and independently. Carers also report that they learn new strategies and activities for them to use at home, but most importantly they value being part of a welcoming and caring community where they can relax and have some fun.





Each week our activities include, free play, story time, singing/musical instruments, morning tea and craft. We also spend time in the garden with the children actively caring for the plants. They love to play in this space.

Throughout our program we embed Aboriginal perspectives into our weekly program and bring attention to significant days. These include Sorry Day, Reconciliation Week, NAIDOC and Indigenous Literacy Day.

We have had numerous special events such as a Christmas Dance Party (thanks to Ian, Mark and Colin for your assistance), Easter Egg Hunt, an International Women's Day and Mother's Day morning tea, Father's Day gift making, National Simultaneous Story Time, Harmony Day, Book Week and our annual Teddy Bears Picnic.



At Kidsplay@Revesby we have a wonderful community of children, parents and grandparents. The group cares for and support each other both at playgroup and in other contexts. The children love the time to meet and engage with friends through play. We also know that playgroup is a very important space

for adults who enjoy time to chat and connect with others, building strong friendships and

support networks.

We are very proud of the work we do in our playgroup. Thank you to our dedicated team of volunteers and our congregation for their interest and support. Thank you also to Revesby Worker's Club for their continued financial support and encouragement.

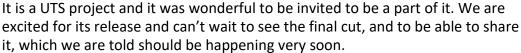




The Rivergum Community Garden Report



Our community garden continues to attract a lot of attention from the local community. October was an especially big month for the garden. We had a talented film crew make a short documentary film 'Measuring What Matters'.







Also last October, Julie and Rae attended a special final presentation day at The University of Technology, in Sydney where our assigned team of design students, Kaitlyn Davies-Scourfield, Jason Tran, Leo Tren, Phil Reyestan and Erica Roberts, calling themselves 'Verdant Studio', presented us with the final digital design package that they had created for us. It was a wonderful experience being involved with this creative team of young people. It was something that could have been daunting. They listened closely to our vision for the garden and asked us lots of questions. This talented team made it a joyful experience. At the presentation day they gifted us a physical sample of the artwork in the

form of flyers, seed envelopes and jars of jam labeled with our unique graphics and logo.

We now have artwork and templates that enable us to print posters, flyers and graphics that we can use on our social media pages and any merchandise or products that we may want to label. This great initiative was part of The Shopfront Project. And a special Thank you to Rachel Bertram for assisting us during this process.



Our Grand Opening on the 27 November 2022 was a memorable day for our community. Aunty Carol and Uncle John performed a cleansing of the garden with a smoking ceremony and a beautiful, moving welcome to country.

There was food and craft and sample bags and lots of fun for everyone. 100+ people attended, and the story of our garden was shared.

There were posts on other social media pages and we received some lovely messages of support, appreciation and encouragement. Members from the Gunyah Community Garden traveled from Northbridge for the day and presented the garden with an Atherton Raspberry bush, which has just born its first fruits and they are delicious. The state member for East Hills attended and Bankstown Council were also represented.



We purchased a 'Wooly Bush', an Australia native, Adenanthos sericeus, to permanently mark the day. Its fluffy, cuddly appearance seemed to speak to us of how we were feeling about the garden, and it is now in its established position in the sensory garden.

We launched our Instagram page in early December 2022 and it is linked to the RUC Facebook page this helps us to keep everyone updated with our weekly gardening adventures. We have 55 followers at the moment.

During the year there have been many different people come through the garden on a Friday morning. Some to say Hi and have a chat and share a cuppa. Some have come to gift us their seedlings and to share the produce from their own gardens. And then there's the hard-working garden team that like to get their hands dirty each week.

Matthew our volunteer and his carer Alisha have become dear friends and we look forward to seeing them both each Friday afternoon. Matt benefits from his involvement and we benefit from his dedicated participation.

He has taught us so much about being truly present and grateful.

We continue to receive great feedback about our beautiful laser cut, Corten steel, garden gate. We'd like to thank the property committee and volunteers for its installation and the extension of the arbour to support it, it brings the community a lot of joy and makes a great backdrop for photos!



Another big thank you to the property committee for keeping the lawns and hedges looking fabulous all year round.

We have been sharing seeds, produce and plants throughout the year at the front gate where we make good use of the sandstone ledges under the arbour. We have learnt that our local postman loves his plants and veggies very much and often stops by for a chat. There's a lovely lady who drops in for some spinach every now and then to add to her soups. Many people out on their daily 'walk', stop and say hi, give us a nod of approval or a wave as they pass by. 'The Table Top Gamers' have told us they love sitting in the garden in the evenings and that they find it to be an amazing and beautiful space. So many of the groups that visit our church make good use of the garden on a regular basis.



We have set up a worm farm and have established several compost stations throughout the garden. We are helping to tend to the small garden attached to RUCCC, we have established a strawberry patch with some heritage variety strawberries and a herb garden. And the children should soon be able to enjoy a patch full of sunflowers and corn. We've planted a dwarf lime and lemon and a passionfruit vine.

In the front raised beds we have broccoli, beetroot, fennel, rhubarb, spinach, tomatoes, mint, chives, carrots, lettuce, leeks and garlic growing. We are in the process of replanting the 'Bee Garden' with a summer crop of sunflowers.

We've enjoyed some outings and lunches as well as our regular morning teas.

The donations from the 'Trade Table', that is set up in the foyer of the church has assisted us to continue planting and growing. We are most grateful.

In the year ahead we are looking at including workshops for the community and organising some garden related activities for the KidsPlay children.

We would like to welcome new friends with the distribution of flyers and some permanent signage for the garden.

We plan to add a 'market stall' on the last Friday of the month where we would sell seedlings, propagated plants, homemade jams, soaps and candles. We are excited for the growing year ahead.
